Seeds of hope for Northern Uganda

For people in the Lukodi region in Northern Uganda, where Bright Futures is working in partnership with the community, access to oxen, seed and micro loans is helpina transform their communities and their lives following two decades of war.

On his recent project monitoring visit, Bright Futures Development Coordinator, David Woodroofe found just how great the impact has been. David reports that in every village he visited the meeting discussion centred on the way in which God had blessed them with the gifts of seed, oxen and micro-loans funds provided and the huge difference this was making.

Thanks to a generous grant to the project from Entrust Foundation, oxen have been provided in many villages and this has enabled more land to be planted. Additionally, the grant provided a diverse range of seeds to improve production of food and this enabled a grain bank to be established. Those receiving arain for planting repay 150% of their initial borrowing into the grain bank following harvest for use by others.

The micro-loans program operating through the nine Rot Kweri's (village self help groups) within the project is providing a valuable resource for those in the community to access funds at critical times. The mutual accountability in these small savings groups results in rapid repayment of loans and the creation of a supportive environment.

During the visit it was also a privilege for David, and the small team from Bright Futures who were with him, to participate in the official handover of a bus generously donated by the Driver family. The bus will provide a much needed transport option for this isolated community. A priority for the next stage of the project is to improve access to education for those children who do not attend school or who, for economic or cultural reasons, leave prematurely. While the work in Lukodi is a work in progress – large strides have already been taken and this is only the beginning.

India: Storm, fire & generosity

Storm: A recent violent storm in Bangalore struck BCM's Sinclair School (pictured) ripping off the roof and damaging classrooms. BCM Director, Jonathan Paul Raj says, "We thank God that no one was injured as it happened during school holidays and none of the 500+ children were present." The damage is significant however and has required a steel reinforced concrete roof to be built in time for resumption of

Fire: Hosur Bande is a dangerous place at the best of times. Thousands lives in this granite quarry village and labourers break stone down to building blocks and gravel by hand. The BCM/Bright Futures work in this quarry includes a tiny child care centre where young children are cared for while their parents work on the quarry floor. Tragically, a fire broke out in the small thatch houses (pictured to right) adjacent to the centre and a baby in one of the houses was incinerated.

Generosity: Thanks to the generosity of Bright Futures donors emergency funds were provided to help in each of the above situations. It's still not too late to make a tax deductible donation to help those affected in Hosur Bande fire as further medical care and support is needed. Help is also still needed to complete repairs to the school.

Dorcas Creations is a labour of love for Jane Thuo. In response to her concern for women in her community in Nairobi. Kenya, many of whom have experienced violence, poverty and HIV, Jane founded Dorcas Creations as a means for the women to earn income that will offer them independence & dignity.

The women meet weekly in their groups for Bible study and to produce hand crafted jewellery some of which is sold locally and some is sold by Bright Futures in Australia. The income from the sale of the jewellery enables the women to pay for schooling for their children, medical care and housing. It also develops skills and offers them a support network.

Pakistan: Where crops grow and waters flow

The Bright Futures & the Christian Fellowship of Pakistan (CFP) project in the rural village of Youngsonabad continues to develop despite serious difficulties the country faces.

Agriculture: Food production has increased with the provision of a small tractor. Crops include peas, rice, sugar cane and corn and the project is engaged in vocational training.

Water: The community water filtration unit installed last year continues to provide clean water for 120-130 households each month.

Education: Adult literacy classes continue to run in Henry Colony while more than 200 children are supported in schooling at CFP school in Youngsonabad. Seventy of the children are ophans who live in the CFP Childrens Home.
